President's Report

Brooklyn's enduring parking problems came to the surface again in October. Rumours circulated that a three storey car park was being built behind JJ's café and residents were notified that Hornsby Council was considering two hour parking in the Fisherman's Co-Op car park within McKell Park. Emails and letters to Council abounded.

Meanwhile, Brooklyn and river residents, tourists and visitors, railway users and others continue to compete for the limited parking available. Prime parking spaces are being used for car storage, and businesses are losing customers frustrated by inaccessible parking space.

Our parking problems prevent the town progressing, and cause dissention between diverse interest groups. Brooklyn needs a holistic parking solution,

not a proposal (however justified) to suit one cause. The Brooklyn Community Association plans to make 2014 the year to resolve parking in Brooklyn, and we invite other community groups in Brooklyn to join with us in this action.

FIRE! Prepare - Act - Survive Planning to Make A Plan Is NOT A Plan

The NSW Rural Fire Service has launched a major new public awareness campaign, warning people against complacency this bush fire season. Research conducted by the NSW RFS has found that 75% of people recognise that having a Bush Fire Survival Plan could save their life, however only a quarter of people actually make one. The research shows that while the majority of people know that they should have a plan, they put it off, thinking a fire won't happen to them.

It's been over 10 years since the last major fire to hit Brooklyn, with the fires already seen in the Blue Mountains this spring it's something of which we should all be aware.

This coming BCA meeting, our guest speaker will be Jon Gaibor Community Safety Officer of the NSW Rural Fire Service and Captain of Brooklyn's Rural Fire Service Brigade who will be talking to us about making a plan, the dangers and risks and the warning levels during this bush fire season.

A River Message from Peter Coad

Council has been advised of the recurrence of Pacific Oyster Mortality Syndrome (POMS) within the Hawkesbury. Researchers from the University of Sydney, Faculty of Veterinary Science have made the observation during epidemiological research (funded by the Fisheries Research and Development Corporation).

This occurrence was anticipated within the Hawkesbury at this approximate time. Council is continuing to support the research efforts and farmers where possible.

Another Death on The Hawkesbury River Station Stairs

Two locals responded to a man who was found collapsed at the top of the stairs on Hawkesbury River station on Thursday morning, October 3rd. Together they did CPR for around 30 minutes from 6:03 am until around 6:30 am. An ambulance arrived from Mooney Mooney about 6:15-6:20, at which time the victim finally had a defibrillator attached and delivering shocks. The Resus Ambulance did not arrive from Woy Woy until about 6:35am.

The first aiders do not know if earlier access to a PAD (public access defibrillator) would have made a difference but research shows that if a defibrillator can be attached within eight minutes from the time someone collapses from cardiac arrest their chance of survival is much greater. If there had been a PAD on the station the first aiders may have given the victim a better chance of survival.

One of the first aiders has written to see if the Brooklyn Community Association might help investigate the possibility of putting a PAD on the station or somewhere in the centre of Brooklyn. Given the ambulance response time and the large number of residents as well as tourists who visit Brooklyn, this could potentially save lives.

HAWKESBURY, What's in a Name?

The Hawkesbury River was named by Governor Phillip in June 1789, after Charles Jenkinson, 1st Earl of Liverpool, who at that time was titled Baron Hawkesbury. An obelisk was unveiled in 1939 at Brooklyn to commemorate the naming. In 1794, 22 families were granted land at Bardenarang, now known as Pitt Town Bottoms, near Windsor. In that same year, confrontations between Aboriginal people and settlers broke out.



Manly Junior State Championship in Brooklyn
