OUR SEWER IS UP AND RUNNING

After decades of waiting, it's finally happened -Brooklyn is now a sewered community. Still a long way from connecting all the households that have signed up for the scheme, our first residents have now severed their ties to pump-out companies and septic tanks.

As residents west of the rail overpass race to meet the deadline of December 20th - the date by which all rectification must be completed in order to have PSP do the final connection from the old system to the new (if the distance between the old and new is less than six meters away), PSP is continuing to install new tanks and make final connections for those diligent residents who have their new tank in place and rectification finished and passed by the Sydney Water plumbing inspector.

Residents who have not completed their rectification work and had it inspected and approved by a Sydney Water plumbing inspector by December 20th could be up for as much as \$500 extra on their final plumber's bill, a fairly gloomy thought as we approach Christmas time.

Decommissioning of tanks is the next step once you are connected to the sewer. This involves a pump-out and desludge, that is, removing the solids, an application of lime and breaking in the bottom and sides for concrete tanks. All plastic tanks must be removed and they apparently can be sold on to other communities. No-Fuss, 0405 682 020, Steve Utley, gave a new price of \$350 to any Brooklyn household for a pump-out and desludge of a tank, based on doing multiple properties on the same day. Liming the tank is free. If

you have a two tank system get a final pump-out done (if you are on pump-out) or Steve can pump-out the liquids tank for \$250 on a Saturday.

Owners of bio-treatment systems are charged \$120 per 1,000lt.

Transpacific Industrial Solutions, the contractor to our sewage treatment plant, also expressed interest in working with the Brooklyn community on decommissioning. Phone Steve Spratley, 8723 6700.

It is expensive to use your old septic tank for a stormwater tank collection because Council requires annual inspection of reused septic tanks, about \$200 a year and you need to build an absorption trench if you don't have one already.

Council rebates are available to residents interested in installing rain water tanks on their property. You must attend the relevant workshops in 2008 to qualify and sign up for energy and conservation evaluation. All this could save you many hundreds of dollars in the years to come.

Crocodile Excavations is an excavation company working in the area to provide decommissioning assistance, in particular destroying the concrete tanks and filling suitable dirt back into the hole that's left. They can be reached though Dave Penno, 0427 055 016.

Footpath Progress

One of the problem sections along Brooklyn Road is our own Heartbreak Hill, the paved but very steep section opposite Baden Powell Ave towards James Road - not a problem for the fit and agile but some of our older residents find it a challenge. To avoid the climb they cross Brooklyn Rd to walk on the grass.

This stretch of Brooklyn Road was included in the 2008-2009 budget for paving but after representation to Council, the Works Department is looking to bring it forward to this year's budget and cancelling the intended footpath in the 2007-2008 budget in front of the playing fields, something the resident's at the last BCA meeting felt was counter-productive to the community and the users of the playing field.

Council has been asked to look at the installation of 90 degree parking signs at the oval to keep parking there a little more orderly, especially during games. The possibility of altering the location and angle of the many chevron signs to give pedestrians a little more room to move by them safely is also under review. All are steps towards a safer Brooklyn.

Stream Watch Activities

Streamwatch is a school and community education and action program that raises awareness of the natural environment through testing water quality in local rivers and streams. The program empowers groups to protect the health of local waterways through their involvement in water quality monitoring.

Streamwatch groups (primary school, high school and community) are trained by their Regional Coordinator to use the Streamwatch kit to monitor the water quality regularly and upload their testing results onto the Streamwatch website. Results outside the norm are investigated and reported upon.

Brooklyn volunteers monitor the surrounding waters once a month and we are looking for more volunteers. Unbelievably he has remained in good condition and he and his wife have successfully raised a family of four (at last count) ducklings to 3/4 size. He hobbles around on the remaining stumps and he and the family are now residing around the pool at Lower McKell Park.

What may appear as simply a human (or rather duck) interest story really brings to mind the many birds and other animals that are not as fortunate. Carelessly discarded fishing line, even just the off cuts, can cause significant harm to our wildlife. As we move into summer think about chucking any fishing line you see lying around into the nearest bin.

On a previous occasion Mark Formston and Kevin Comber explained to the community that if we see something amiss we need to report it to the Police. If this happens, the issue gets logged, it can be investigated and resources can be assigned to our area to solve the problem and possibly prevent it from happening again.

However, no report, no investigation, no resources, no solution. Officially, Brooklyn doesn't have street racing.
