A Report from the Community Hall Committee - Liz Surrest

As a result of a recent article that appeared in the Bush Tele, representatives of the Hall Committee presented at last week's Council meeting. In a nutshell, it was reported that Council wanted to use funds from other community hall accounts in the Shire to build a hall for us. This apparently was not the intention of Council when Community Services was asked to explore funding options and we certainly understand why the idea failed. If the money was forthcoming and used as collateral for a bank loan to build a hall, there was no clear way we could see to make the loan repayments. As much as we appreciate it, Anna and I know how hard it is to volunteer time and raise funds, and we would not want that hard earned money taken away from Brooklyn to be used in other areas.

On numerous occasions we have spoken at Council asking them to implement paid parking for **out of Shire** residents using the boat ramp at Parsley Bay. This is a valuable Shire asset and the user pay principle is more than reasonable and is successfully applied in many waterside communities throughout NSW. If this scheme had been implemented when we first suggested it 18 months ago, Council would have had well in excess of \$375,000 by now based on a survey done by the Hall Committee of out of Shire vehicles using Parsley Bay in a non-peak period.

This revenue source would easily support a bank loan for building Brooklyn's hall. Other communities support their hall largely from Section 94 funds (developer contributions) but this funding source, depending on substantial development, is limited in Brooklyn.

Our school children have nowhere to conduct their daily after-school activities and Brooklyn's need for a community hall is critical. If you agree and can lend a hand, please phone 9985 7350.

Rail Steps-Community's Biggest Problem

Dear Mrs Graham,

I refer to your correspondence received by the Minister for Transport regarding Hawkesbury River Station. The Minister has asked me to respond on his behalf.

Hawkesbury River Station is to undergo a \$1.3 million upgrade to replace the existing stairs. A close examination of the existing stairs was conducted by RailCorp in response to feedback from local commuters who, as you are aware, found the stairs difficult to use as they were steep and uneven. The examination identified no issues in relation to the structural integrity of the stairs, however, it was determined that the stairs should be replaced to address the safety risk posed by the existing geometry.

I am advised by RailCorp that the current upgrade proposal was solely designed with the intention of providing an immediate enhancement to safety.

Planning for the new set of stairs has already begun and the concept design stage has already been completed. Work is scheduled to commence in mid-2008 and is expected to be completed in late 2008.

RailCorp is well aware of the desire among local residents for a full accessibility upgrade to Hawkesbury River Station. You can be assured, when funding priorities are next being considered your requests will be taken into consideration, along with the requests of other rail commuters.

You may be aware that all CityRail stations now have a portable platform ramp which can assist passengers (including those who use wheelchairs or electric mobility scooters) to board or alight from a train safely. If you require boarding assistance, arrangements will need to be put in place at the departure station to advise staff of your travel plans, so they can be ready to assist. People requiring this service will need to arrive at the station 15 minutes prior to the train departure time.

Alternatively this service can be accessed by notifying the guard located on the train. The guard's compartment on a train is marked by a blue light.

A platform levelling program is also underway to make station platforms safer for parents with strollers or people in wheelchairs.

I trust this information is of assistance.

Anne and her late husband Bill encouraged State Rail to prepare plans for a subway to Hawkesbury River Station platform which was to be implemented except Sydney was chosen as the next Olympic city and all funds were diverted to Olympic related projects. Now, 13 years later we are fighting for what was to happen in 1995.

What you can do to help police in tracking down offenders

Police often get information from the public and from groups about suspect behaviour or an actual crime that has either just happened or is happening then and there. Police get great info about what the offender looked like, what they are wearing, how many there are and the type or colour of the car. Few reports actually have the car's registration number. It is difficult in a high stress situation to focus on a rego plate. But having a command that is 420sq km's police aren't always around the corner to find the blue car with three people on board. That rego number is very important. It gives them details to learn if the car is stolen and if it is not stolen then the police have a good chance of matching the owner to a description you give them or in some cases eliminating them. If the car is stolen all is not lost police can fingerprint the car.

Here are some helpful hints that you may want to use if you do see a suspect car or a crime occurring. If you're in the garden, write the rego number in the dirt then go to the phone. Put the number in your mobile or use your mobile to take a photo. Use a rock or other hard item and scratch the number on the gutter or on your driveway. If you have a pen write the number on your arm. This saves you having to repeat a rego number 10 times to remember it before you ring the police. The RTA does issue all different plate colours and types so try to see if it's NSW or Qld etc and describe the colour or arrangement of the letters and numbers.

Property works continue in Brooklyn and crews have also been re-established on Dangar Island to start connecting properties there. Brooklyn connections are at 59% which is a really good result, however there are still properties dragging the chain. We encourage anyone who has had the PSP equipment installed on their property to connect as soon as possible so that the environmental benefits of the scheme can be achieved for the whole of the community.

It is important that you notify Sydney Water before your plumber makes your connection to the sewer as not every property has a pump installed inside the collection tank. Please try to provide at least 5 days notice so that Sydney water can arrange to return to your property, install the pump and make sure your electricals are switched on and ready to go.
