#### Co-Presidents' Report

After a long winter, we are pleased to see Brooklyn bouncing back after the recent terrible weather to the joy of the warmer months. We have noticed an increase in visitors to the Village and Cottage over the past month and thank all of you who have volunteered or just stopped by.

The BCA has been extremely busy over the last couple of months, and we have quite a few news items to share with you.

Since early August, the BCA Committee embarked on a series of consultations and discussions with over 80 of our residents, 16 local businesses and recreational clubs seeking feedback and suggested improvements to the Hornsby Shire Council's Parking Plan (Plan).

This Plan related to the implementation of proposed changes to timed parking and the banning of trailer parking on public streets and land throughout the Village east of the rail bridge. The final submission reflected a huge effort from many of those in our Village and we can't thank you enough. Council tells us that they received approximately 400 survey responses and 235 written submissions. To read more see the Parking article within this edition of the Gateway.

The long wait for a board walk linking Kangaroo Point to Brooklyn Road opposite Tom Richmond Oval is almost over as the project is now fully funded. This is one of the missing links in the shared path project. We will keep you updated on the progress over the coming year. The BCA will continue to lobby for rebuilding of the path in the area from Brooklyn Central to the Public school. The current path is in part dirt, with trip hazards and often under water. This continues to be a priority for the BCA Committee. Council's Places to Roam program is supported by the BCA. This NSW Government funded program aims to deliver more access to communities through a series of open space opportunities such as making new great walks, access to outdoor recreation, nature, open space and waterways. The BCA Committee sincerely thank Council and our Place Planners, David Johnston and Julia Morton, for their efforts to provide safer access to the recreational opportunities in and around Brooklyn.

On 22 October 2022, Steven Head, HSC General Manager presented to the Brooklyn community the reasons behind the proposed special rate variation (SRV). Many questions from the floor were answered and debated. Those who attended expressed their appreciation to Steven for taking several hours out of his Saturday to personally explain to us what is required to "secure long-term financial stability, maintain assets and fund high priority initiatives..."

Robert and I would like to say thank you to everyone, especially to the Committee for their support over the past 12 months in our shared role as president. It has been an interesting and challenging year, we celebrated Jane Cole's 100th birthday, farewelled our committee member, Charles Essery, after his sudden passing and welcomed many who have chosen to call beautiful Brooklyn home.

In other news, after 12 months of working with Robert Arnold, as Co-President, he has decided to step down as President and take some time to travel with his wife, Karen. The BCA and Brooklyn community are better for his Presidency and dedication over many years and we have valued his vast range of experience and hard work. Robert, we say thank you and wish you and Karen well on your travels.

The BCA hope to see everyone at the AGM on 3 December 2022 so we can wish you a very Merry Christmas and the best for 2023 in person!

#### Parking update

Most people in Brooklyn and the river communities are aware of Hornsby Shire Council's Parking Plan for Brooklyn, and many have made submissions or participated in community submissions to Council.

The Brooklyn Community Association made a detailed community submission to the Council on 30 October 2022, resulting from consultations and discussions with over 80 of our residents, 16 local businesses and several recreational clubs. That submission is available on the Brooklyn Community Association webpage.

The BCA submission incorporates the Association's proposals for parking management controls in the Brooklyn Village that we believe will be more effective, more equitable and more responsive to the community, river residents' and visitors' requirements than the controls proposed in the exhibited Council's Car Parking Management Report. The submission focuses on Stage 1 changes, over the next 3 (or so) years, prior to more significant changes in Stage 2.

The Brooklyn community generally agrees that timed parking is required throughout much of Brooklyn Village Centre, to better manage the use and availability of parking spaces. However, a single, simple timing protocol (as proposed in Council's report) will not work for any of the user groups in Brooklyn and will perpetuate the contested chaos as is currently experienced. Proposed timed parking is generally limited to daytime hours (6am to 6pm).

The BCA has identified that user groups have differing needs and the BCA's submission proposes fairer solutions for all user groups, including:

- Short-term spaces (15 & 30 mins), to improve access for retail businesses
- Medium-term (4, 8 & 12hrs) with limited introduction of angle and stacked parking
- Longer-term (72hrs and unlimited timing at Upper McKell overflow area)
- Specific small provision for authorised shift workers and authorised businesses
- Retention of commuter and accessibility parking and provision for authorised users and car share spaces (GoGet style)
- Provision for Brooklyn residents without onsite parking
- Removal of all cars, car and trailer parking restrictions in Parsley Bay car park on weekdays and implementation of changed restrictions on weekends and Public Holidays

These proposals will achieve the following benefits:

- Foreshore spaces for short-term users, especially visitors
- Increased turnover of most spaces, with many spaces unlimited overnight


- Provision for river residents to park overnight, for 3 days or unlimited in Upper McKell overflow area, without committing to significant capital funding and long-term leases
- Parking for business staff would be available in Wambool Street, at the Upper McKell overflow area and Parsley Bay (weekdays)

The BCA is meeting with Ward A Councillors and senior Council officers to walk through our submission, and to emphasise the need for change and improvement.

Council officers are now analysing the results of their

survey and the many submissions they have received. They aim to present the outcomes to Councillors late this year or early in 2023. We would expect that implementation parking changes won't take place until the second quarter of 2023. We also anticipate there will be further consultation with the community prior to



implementation, as Council plan a progressive rollout of new parking protocols.

### Flying: Circuses and Squadrons

A small enthusiastic and appreciative crowd were drawn to Brooklyn Cottage on Sunday, 18 September for the: "Who bought down the Red Baron?" event.

Inside the Cottage visitors were treated to ripping yarns including an audio recording of Frank Wormald's eye witness accounts, a fascinating display of 60-year-old news clippings and more recent discoveries of a piece of fabric from the Barons triplane (now safely secured in a hidden location in Brooklyn).

Outside they were entranced by the beautiful historic 18ft skiff visiting from the Flying Squadron, Kirribilli and marvelled at the craftsmanship required to build them. The impact of such an event isn't measured by the number of bums on seats nor lottery tickets sold. Qualitative measures of impact are most often undetectable. They fly under the radar.

Teachers everywhere know how a throw away comment of praise or engagement can inspire interest and fascination in a field, lifelong learning and future career path.

So too the ripple effects of tossing a stone into a pond It's impossible to predict the longer-term effects of these shared experiences and events.

For this observer the stand out stories woven on the day included:

- A family that had travelled across the shire to compare the Buie story with the differing one their grandparents had told them.
- A loving father capturing all possible audio recordings and images for his history loving son unable to attend due to MS.
- A 10 year boy so fascinated by the stories he read every page, listened intently to the audio and watched the whole video of further evidence: The man who killed the Red Baron?
- An elderly lady eagerly awaiting to meet relatives to share reminisce and celebrate.
- The dozens of listeners that on leaving the Cottage when asked: "Who shot down the Red baron?" Responded and saluted in unison: The Brooklyn Fisherman: Gunner Robert Buie.
- Myff Sharp's book sale of classic and esoteric history and military titles and the many interested people that perused them.
  - As Ian Allen noted some of these books are must haves for any fashion, film or costume design company.
- The attendance of Robert Tearne boat builder, life member of Sydney Flying Squadron and living legend of Australian sailing.
  - Rob has a lifetime of reading history and making history.
- The historic 18ft skiff Myra Too that Rob brought and rigged to showcase.
- The many old salts that came to run their hands along the beautiful timber of the classic wooden skiff. Their smiles of joy at their proximity to the skiff and the master craftsman that builds them

- Local identity, Bob Davis and Rob Tearne cooperating to construct and demonstrate their parachute release pole.
  - Their smiles when the chute opened perfectly and floated to the ground.

Frank Wormalds recorded eye witness account retells the German myth that: "the Red Baron did not carry a parachute...It was the first thing souvenired by the Australian ground troops."

Robert Tearne provided a copy of the WW1 Honour Roll of the Sydney Flying Squadron.

Some of these men were transported on: The Anchises. The same ship as Robert Buie.

No doubt they would have met. Men of the water off to

fight in the mud of the trenches.

# Peat Island and Mooney Mooney planning proposal update

The Department of Planning and Environment released the following update in relation to the Peat Island and Mooney Mooney planning proposal in October 2022.

"We are pleased to advise the NSW Government has reached a landmark agreement to transfer Peat Island to the Darkinjung Local Aboriginal Land Council.


A Deed of Agreement for the pending transfer has now been executed between Property & Development NSW and the land council.

The Government has been liaising with Darkinjung over the last few years and has been in detailed negotiations with the land council since January 2022.

This land transfer agreement is an historic moment that recognises the Aboriginal community's cultural connection to this land. We will continue to work with the land council to help realise its vision for Peat Island to be used in ways that will create economic and cultural opportunities for the local Aboriginal population and for all Australians.

The Government will also be undertaking maintenance work on the island and its associated foreshore sites at Mooney Mooney over coming months, including vegetation clearing on the mainland, the demolition of non-heritage-listed derelict structures to address significant health and safety risks, and the clean-up of debris on the island.

The Government remains committed to the revitalisation of this much-loved area and to delivering long-term economic, social and community benefits.



## BCA Annual General Meeting: Special Presentation Climate Wise Hornsby Presentation

In Hornsby Shire, a home's energy usage is collectively the largest contributor Greenhouse to Gas Emissions in the shire. Hornsby Shire Council have committed to a Net Zero by 2050 target Greenhouse of Gas **Emission** reductions, in line with global agreements. Doing your bit towards meeting these targets might save



you some money too.

A strong focus on energy reduction at the household level, contributes to both personal and global sustainability. Saving energy is also often a way to make a household budget go that little bit further, as energy wastage is money lost.

## An update from the Mooney Mooney & Cheero Point Progress Association (MCPA)

I am pleased to provide this update on the many exciting happenings within the MCPA. The MCPA is in the final stages of signing a licence agreement with Property NSW to allow us to continue to manage the old school building and grounds, and the Mooney Chapel. This is a three year agreement which will allow us to move forward with many of our plans.

We have secured a \$5000 grant from Central Coast Council to allow us to pay for the necessary insurance policies and to create a community garden in the grounds of the old school. The memorial seat for Maree Dunn has been installed overlooking the proposed garden site and we will organise a suitable event to acknowledge Maree's service to our community.

The River Hub continues to increase its activities. The Thursday craft group has around 10 regular attendees and has already made 40 Trauma Teddies for delivery to Hornsby Hospital.

Library and storytime continues to be an important part of the hub for our younger community members. It was wonderful to see so many families and young kids participate in Halloween recently. I never thought that I would again see so many children living in Mooney and Cheero. It absolutely breathes new life and excitement into our area.

We now have a Chapel committee to help manage booking and events in the Chapel and I know they have some exciting events planned in the near future to better use this amazing asset. A huge thank you to the Chapel committee for all your hard work.

The tennis court continues to be a great asset for our community and is increasing in use and popularity. Thank you to everyone who is looking after this facility and for the way everyone is working together on this one. Thanks to the generosity of one of our newer families, we are currently in the process of installing a basketball hoop on the area next to the tennis court. Most of you will have heard the news that Peat Island has been handed over to the Darkinjung Aboriginal Community and our progress association will continue to work closely with Darkinjung to ensure that our community is part of their exciting project. Already their CEO Brendan has given us one presentation and is always willing to provide further updates and presentations. I understand that a community open day is planned for late November and I will circulate this information once it is available.

Our annual Community family day is tentatively scheduled for 2pm on Sunday, 18 December on the old school oval in Point Rd. All Mooney and Cheero residents are very welcome. A more formal invite will be circulated closer to the date, but it will be a great opportunity to join with your neighbours in a relaxed atmosphere and to meet many of our newer residents.

The MCPA continues to make representations on behalf of our community. We are currently trying to get RMS to mow and cutback the verges and medium strips as they have been neglected and it is now a dangerous situation with vision being impeded in some areas. Also the motorbike and night time car races are continuing to cause concern and we have raised these issues with highway patrol.
