Co-Presidents' Report

In our last newsletter we introduced the new Committee, mentioned Council's progress regarding parking management and the results of Council's survey. The BCA generally promoted its quarterly meetings as a way for our community and business residents to be informed, have their views heard and generally keep in touch with various activities around town. We still need a Treasurer for the BCA, which warrants about 1-2 hours a month. Please consider if you have capacity for this and reach out to our team.

February's meeting hosted an important presentation on Sustainability and tips and tricks on how to save money on energy costs. We reported on this in the <u>February newsletter</u> and savings are presented again in this issue.

Rumours of a \$5 million car park were quashed at the February meeting with clarification that the \$5 million was only relevant if the Liberal Coalition party was returned to power at the State Election in March, and that Matt Kean was returned as NSW Treasurer. Neither eventuated. It was also clarified that these monies, if realised, would go to Hornsby Council for general investment in public parking in Brooklyn, not a dedicated car park. Read the Minutes on the BCA website for further information.

Council voted at its April meeting to adopt a Brooklyn Car Parking Management Plan. An article in this issue helps clarify what is proposed with trailer management in public reserve areas as the first cab off the rank.

The most pressing issue for many in Brooklyn and the river communities is the loss of our Australia Post postal and financial services. Post office box holders were given one week's notice. Over 60 people turned up on 31 March to signal the day the music died and to provide a rallying call for us all to be involved. Please write Julian Leeser MP to julian.leeser.mp@aph.gov.au and Gordon Reid MP at Gordon.reid.mp@aph.gov.au and secretary@brooklyncommunity.org.au. Ask for their continued help to restore our services. Let them know what the loss has meant to you personally and/or your business.

The article inside this Gateway provides more updates and information. It is important to say that whatever people have heard through the grapevine, our fight to have our full service resumed is not over yet.

The recent survey that many completed (complete it here: https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/X3SZSDM - all contact details are kept confidential) is a clear indication of the need and the use of a licensed post office. 95% of 200 survey respondents to date said they would use this facility if it was re-instated.

More than ever we need Brooklyn, river community residents and business owners to make their case known in raising awareness and writing letters. Special thanks to all those who are helping in one way or another to restore our postal services.

Please attend our next meeting on Saturday, 3 June 2023 from 10am-12noon, which is an opportunity to hear the latest, connect with other residents on common issues and friendships. Also look out inside for our celebratory Welcome to Brooklyn series of events – for newcomers and oldstayers alike, parents and children welcome, an opportunity for connection – all welcome.

Come down to the Village and support our cafes, businesses and the pharmacy

While the post office is missing, committed locals and the BCA are working hard to get our postal and financial services back. Let us know if you can help as well. There is a lot to do and even a letter or an email helps - it takes a village.

With one week's notice, Australia Post officially accepted the license being handed back by a representative of the former licensee.

This occurred on 31 March. Typically Australia Post requires 3 months' notice as a contractual requirement to provide for transition. From the day this occurred, the BCA and others sought options to maintain even a reduced presence for a transitional period to support our communities. There was little thought to the impact on our river communities – just under 2000 people many of whom are boat access only and isolated. While the river is blessed to have the Hawkesbury River Postman (which delivers mail under contract to some settlements) and Dangar Island (who have a community postal agency, which sorts and holds onto mail), Australia Post has not established anything for other communities that would have benefited from their postal box at Brooklyn or who are unable to travel to Berowra, Kariong or Gosford, 40-50km round trips by car or 3-5 hours by public transport. We are not identified as Regional or Remote yet it certainly feels that way. Financial Services are key!

Thank you to all those who are supporting the need. 60 residents attended our meeting and rallying call on 31 March. Around 30 residents came on 21 April meet with

ΑII communities circulated survey (https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/X3SZSDM) the days that followed. Around 20 residents, delegates from each river settlement attended a meeting with Australia Post executives Sarah, Micah and Caroline on 4 May to discuss the impact and learn from Australia Post their plan for restoration of our service. Australia Post wanted to hear from the community but would not be drawn into any solutions or plan. At the meeting, Australia Post committed to sending through financial and process information related to a licensed post office to ensure an application for an LPO met their needs. No information forthcoming. Finally some six weeks later Australia Post has offered a community postal agency. However, there is no analysis or data provided that supports this and it does not acknowledge our circumstances. A postal agency is limited and has no financial services available a key service requested by community members.

Australia Post is a Government Business Enterprise, one of two under the federal government legislation and responsibility of the Minister Communications. It may operate as a commercial business but where are its community obligations.

We are negotiating with Australia Post who have suggested that a licensed post office is not financially sustainable. Sustainability has many dimensions and once upon a time in fairy dell, Australia Post was a success story guaranteeing every town both postal services and financial services. Without a banking service we are hard hit to support our community and existing businesses and services to ensure their economic viability. The resident or business that buys their stamps, sends a postal article, using PostBillPay or banks their cash with their preferred bank through Australia Post, also pops next door for a coffee or gets a script filled from the Pharmacy. So impact on one is impact on all.

The Australia Post rep previously said to Julian Leeser's Office on 30 March they would work through any interested applicants to take on the licensed post office. "We have advised expressions of interest are open and though the LPO will close tomorrow (31 March), a new LPO or CPO can be opened". We should hold Australia Post to this.

Some key stats from the survey so far: Of 200 responses, 96% consider Aust Post is an essential service and 95% would support the business if reopened.49% used Express Post, 53% used Parcel Collect, 54% JP service, 48% postal boxes, 48% passport ID. Banking 38%, PostPay 30%. The BCA considers this makes for a viable business that could be well supported with 35% of responses identifying they would use the service once a week and 8% once a day.

Julian Leeser MP is advocating strongly with the Minister for Communications and CEO of Australia Post to enable the return of our licensed post office.

The owner of the current premises is dedicated to standing by currently hoping that the post office will return to Brooklyn. A community postal agency is not good enough and does not provide the financial services we need. The BCA continues to negotiate with Australia Post to be upfront and transparent with the community about the financials to support a licensed post office. A petition is coming soon.

Hornsby Council Parking Recommendations

Hornsby Council have now moved to an implementation stage of their Brooklyn parking review project after consultation in 2022, and the General Manager's recommendations to Councillors in early 2023.

Many in the community contributed to the BCA workshop consultations of residents and businesses that were held in 2022, which resulted in the BCA's submission to Council. Many more in the community, including river communities and associations, contributed to the broader consultation on parking, made submissions and completed Hornsby Council's Have your Say survey later in 2022. Many consultations, data analysis and reports over the years informed the position now put forward by Council.

On 12 April 2023, Councillors voted to support changes in Brooklyn Car Parking Management, recommended in the General Manager's report and attachments, shown on the BCA website at https://brooklyncommunity.org.au/car-parking-in-brooklyn/ or go to Council pages direct and you can see links to the report, attachments and minutes (https://businesspapers.hornsby.nsw.gov.au/).

Attachment 2 of the Council's report provides more on what is planned (see table in this article for quick reference).

Stage 1

From discussion with Council officers the BCA has learned that trailers will be the focus for the first tranche of changes. This will begin in June or July over a 3-6 month period. Council will contact trailer owners via a letter with fact sheet attachments detailing the requirements and overall timeframe. Council clarified that a key focus is to unattached trailers – that is, trailers with or without a boat on land associated with public reserves. Upper McKell Park reserve is likely the first focus of activity for Council with Parsley Bay and Lower McKell to follow. Note, Council is intending to sign post all car parks associated with public reserves outside of the village area but within Brooklyn – as car only parking. This includes Saltpan Reserve and Tom Richmond Oval.

This also signals changes to State Government legislation and the Unattended Properties Act. What does it mean for the community? You can learn more here:

Timed parking will commence **in lower McKell Park** (cars parked on the foreshore side, not hillside)
and in the **wharf carpark** that Council hopes to
complete before summer.

Previous parking arrangements in **Parsley Bay** will be replaced by more flexible parking allowing cars with trailers or without to park. This follows more detailed feedback from the broader community and recognising that previous changes were not working.

Stage 2 and beyond

The BCA has only included some of the highlights of Stage 1 above. The table has a lot more detail. It includes a number of place planning initiatives as part of Stages 2 and 3 in the table some of which is subject to further planning and consultation by Council or budgetary constraints = No time soon!

Approved Recommendations Council Meeting GM 1/23 12 April 2023

That Council:

- **1.** Acknowledge the efforts and contribution of community and stakeholders to this process, particularly in trying to seek a common understanding and way forward on a long-standing issue for the Brooklyn and River community.
- **2.** Adopt the proposed car parking management staged, roll out schedule attached to General Manager's Report No. GM1/23 implementing the roll out as part of future Delivery Programs and an Informal Councillor Briefing be held following the trailer removal process to further consider timed parking restrictions.
- **3.** Not proceed with the proposed leased car park in Upper McKell Park overflow area but continue to operate the car park as a free to use parking area in the short to medium term.
- **4.** Note the proposed alternate leased parking locations nominated by the community and further address this matter in the place planning process.
- **5.** Undertake further consultation with the community to determine the extent of need for residents who are not eligible for a Disability Parking Permit but may still require special parking arrangements.
- **6.** Undertake further consultation on the introduction of paid parking in McKell Park and Parsley Bay to respond to community demand for flexible parking.

Table of approved Brooklyn Car Parking Management Changes

Stage 1 - Car parking management

Council exclude trailer parking from McKell Park using the appropriate signage —including within the overflow parking area.

Council work with trailer owners over a 3-6 month period to facilitate this change and to allow trailer owners the opportunity to make long term storage arrangements elsewhere.

Council sign post all car parks associated with public reserves outside of Brooklyn village (but within the suburb of Brooklyn) as "car only" parking to prioritise access for visitors to these reserves.

Offshore residents be encouraged to progress a trailer share scheme —as per their written submissions.

In the event that trailer parking continues to be an issue for on and off street parking locations within the village centre or elsewhere in Brooklyn, further consideration should be given to restricting parking in these areas

— potentially by nominating them as car only parking locations. This matter should be assessed on a site by site basis with the community, using consistent criteria that considers safety, proximity to destinations, impacts on local residents and visitors, alternatives such as timed parking and impacts on surrounding streets of trailer relocation.

Trailer management

Lower McKell Park

Introduce timed parking in Lower McKell Park along the northern (river side) of the carpark: 6am — 6pm 4 hour (4P) and 3 x hour (30 minutes) spaces.

Retain southern side (headland side) of carpark as unrestricted parking. Retain all accessible car parking spaces.

Upper McKell Park

Introduce timed parking in Upper McKell Park along the northern side of the road leading to the picnic area:

8:30am — 6pm 4 hour (4P) and 1 x accessible parking space.

Retain remainder of carpark, including the overflow area to the west as unrestricted.

Dangar Road Car Park (wharf car park)

Introduce timed parking in the Dangar Road Car Park:

6am — 6pm 4 hour (4P) and 3 x hour (30 minutes) spaces.

Retain all accessible car parking spaces.

Timed parking

Introduce flexible parking — car with attached trailer or car only within the parking bays to the south, either side of the amenities building (13 spaces) and within the central portion of the main parking area (36 spaces). The northern portion of the car park should remain car with attached trailer parking only.

Retain all accessible car parking spaces. Retain all car only parking spaces. Retain current parking conditions on breakwall.

Lower McKell Park, Brooklyn Stage 2 – Construction notification – Plumbing works

Council will commence construction works on Monday, 22 May 2023. The aim of this stage of works is to upgrade the water supply to Lower McKell Park. The upgrade will improve water pressure to the amenities block, bubbler and proposed outdoor shower. These works are partly funded by NSW Public Spaces Legacy Program - Bushland to the Waterways.

This work will be programmed to reduce disruption to the carpark and pedestrians. The landscaped area to the north of the carpark will be fenced off in stages and we urge motorists to be careful when parking perpendicular to the construction fencing along this northern edge of the carpark. New pipe work will be installed that crosses the vehicle carriageway. This work will be undertaken in a manner that maintains access beyond this point to the rest of the carpark.

Access will be maintained along the foreshore pathway and to the baths, picnic areas and amenities block for the duration of works. Localised areas will be bunted off during excavation works in areas that are beyond the carpark. The plumbing works will be completed in June. Construction will take place between 7am-5pm Monday to Friday and 8am-1pm on Saturday.



Did you know that May is Brain Cancer Awareness Month?

Many of you know my husband, Ross Bowles; he is an outlier and has survived brain cancer for 10 years. We are one of the 'lucky' families, as only a few remain to be able to advocate and build awareness for more brain cancer research.

Brain cancer affects approximately 2000 Australians per year, small numbers BUT the statistics are disproportionately big:

- Half of those diagnosed with Brain Cancer are dead within 15 months.
- The survival rate 5 years after diagnosis is 22% (95% for prostate and 91% for breast cancer).
- Brain Cancer is the number one killer of adults under 40 of all cancers.
- Brain Cancer kills more children than any other disease.
- There have been no significant changes to treatment in over 40 years.
- Brain Cancer is one of the most underfunded and under-researched cancers, and there aren't many people left to raise awareness.
- Brain Cancer has the highest cost per patient compared to all other cancers.

This year is special to our family, so to celebrate surviving for 10 years, Ross decided to challenge his mind and endurance by setting some goals of his own. Starting on his late father's 100th birthday and finishing with last weekend's 2-day Bike Ride for Brain Cancer, Ross has completed an amazing challenge:

1 - BRAIN CANCER SURVIVOR
10 - DAYS RIDING
100 - KILOMETRES RIDDEN EACH DAY
1,000 - VERTICAL
METRES CLIMBED EACH DAY
10,000 - SOCIAL SHARES - Let's Go Viral
\$100,000 - FUNDRAISING GOAL

Brain Cancer treatments haven't changed in over 40 years. Ross underwent surgery, then 6 weeks of radiation treatments, and finally 6 months of chemotherapy which resulted in an acquired brain injury. So even being lucky to survive, the treatments were brutal, not just for the patient but for the family and community. But he changed, and some of you who know Ross will be nodding your heads, yes. He used to be one of the most active volunteers at the RFS and would always put up his hand to help the community.

He could not continue to run his business of nearly 20 years, so I gave up my job to ensure we had an income for us and our employees. But we are doing okay now, he still has cognitive deficits, but we have learned and adapted, and figured out how to make the best of our lives. We continue to try and give hope of a cure, to patients and families who have lost their loved ones to this insidious disease.

Our protected waters among gumtrees and sandstone escarpments are an amazing place to play. Want to get involved next season?



Marine Rescue Update

Over the past 12 months
Marine Rescue Hawkesbury has successfully conducted a pilot program to explore the effective



utilisation of rescue watercraft, commonly known as Jetskis, on the Hawkesbury River.

The Rescue Water Craft offer distinct advantages over larger rescue vessels typically employed on the Hawkesbury. Their smaller size and enhanced manoeuvrability make them well-suited for swift emergency response in shallow waters and near-



shore areas. They have also been notably effective in scenarios such as medical emergencies and patient transfers, as well as

providing vital support during large events such as surf carnivals and boat races. The program has yielded positive results and



prompted Marine Rescue NSW to consider the expansion of Jetskis and similar vessels in their operations across the State.

As we head into the cooler months it is a good idea to take the time and update any safety equipment. This includes checking your radios and saving your local base number (02 9985 2100) into your phone. You can also download the latest version of the Marine Rescue NSW App which has recently been upgraded with several new features including interactive maps, weather, and safety checklists.

Sustainability

A focus on bees

As I mourn the loss of the European bees that have cohabitated and shared our block for the last 12 years, I acknowledge the broader community of beekeepers that are mourning with me. I will miss the buzz of the hive and the bee highway that was a constant hum of activity to and from the hives.

For those not in the know, the varroa mite has devastated European bee populations around the globe and it arrived at our doorstep. Our bees have had to be eradicated to avoid possible spread. The culling of over 600 hives has already occurred across NSW and more are certain to follow as the red zones continue to grow.

In the cloud of gloom, I realised that I needed to focus on something to help me overcome the misery. It is with this that I decided that I could focus my energy on supporting the population of native bees in my backyard. Native bees are not affected by varroa mite, and by building habitat for native bees and hover flies, we not only help support their populations, but support pollination.

Australian native bees are small and can be hard to see. There are 200 native bee species in Sydney. Some of our more recognisable native bees include the teddy bear bees, which are fluffy and orange, and the blue-banded bees.

How can you help?

Things you can do help our native bees:

 Make your garden native bee-friendly by planting natives. Bees prefer yellow and blue flowers but other flowering plants will also provide the food they need. Native plants include daisies, coastal rosemary, tea trees and nectar-rich trees like gums, lilly pilly and bottle brush.

- Provide nest sites for native bees to lay eggs by not clearing all the dead wood from your trees.
 Leave old hollows and bare ground in your garden. Native bees use shallow burrows in the ground or can make nests in soft mortar between bricks.
- Let some herbs and vegetable plants go to flower.
- · Avoid using poisons or pesticides.
- Install a bee hotel.
- Add a drinking area for bees. Bees can drown in deep water, so fill a bowl with marbles, stones or corks to make it easy for bees to get in and out. If you have a pond they can land on a lily pad.

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
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Brooklyn Community Defib Project - AED Location Map
